- -- Treasurers Report \$10960.61 approved as read.
- -- Last month the election of officers renews our current officers for another year.
- --Hive Management: Keep checking for Queen Cells, Mites and insects. Make sure your hive is not getting honey bound, if so stop feeding and force the bees to go and gather nectar and pollen. Inspect your hives swarm season is still on with this warm weather.
- **If you want to be called for Swarms let Frank Gianino know to put your name and phone on the Website. Currently we have Dave Sieruta and Louie Ivey.
- --Apiary Report, Ray: We have 4 Hives now and 5 NUCS. Probably will split next month to hopefully get up to 10 NUCS for the Lottery in March.
- --Membership Report; check with Susan if you are unsure of your dues payment. Next month she will have a list for the Honey House sign up for the Clay County Fair APR 2-11.

7:25 Our speaker Ray Vickerman, presenting Honey Judging requirements. We will have a honey contest at our Seminar May 2. Outside judges will preside for us. We cannot get it into the CCF this year but we can hold a small judging at the Honey House.

Honey Judging is done on 2 different criteria: Extracted Honey and Black Jar Honey. See the Web site for Rays list of specific criteria.

Extracted Honey:

Must be from clean, fully capped frames Uncapped properly Let it ripen and settle through a fine lint free cloth

If you have bubbles it can be heated very carefully to lift them

Jar must be perfectly clean.

Judged by clarity, correct fill, no adhesive safety cap, color (light, amber, dark)

No finger prints on the jar

Aroma is not a judgment quality but to ensure it has not fermented.

Check the jar lid for cleanliness

No foam or particles

Viscosity is judged with a honey Refractometer

Black Jar honey is based on the judges favorite taste only.

Look at your jar by holding it up, there should be no space between the honey and the cap, Either glass or plastic jars are OK but try to remove all smudges. Based on US Honey Rules. Use Queen Lined Jars. Ray has some for \$1. if needed.

You will not have your name on your honey, you will receive a number for your jar. The honey jars are lined up according to their standing, with a card of comments. Other examples of honey judging: comb honey, section comb honey, candles, wax, and Meade.
