--President's Report: Dave reported that we have \$1760.50 profit from honey sales. With profits from raffles, honey, hats, t-shirts are \$650.80.

--Members who wish to by our honey it will be 1/2 price of the Fair price, for sale at the mtg tonight. We can also sell our honey to others for the CCF price, see Dave S.

--Hive Management:. Inspect your hives every week-10 days; swarm season is still on and keep feeding esp. your NUCS with 1:1. Keep checking for Queen Cells, Mites and insects.

**If you want to be called for Swarms let Frank Gianino know to put your name and phone on the Website. Currently we have Dave Sieruta and Louie Ivey.

--Apiary Report, Ray: We have 7 Hives now with double brood boxes on 4. 5 NUCS and 3 with Castles.

--Mentor Report; nothing to report at this time.

--Dave presented Luke Harlow with a Certificate of Appreciation for all the work he has done on our behalf the past 4 years. Sadly he will be relocating in a few months to Union County.

--Are we happy with the way the CCBA is headed? He stressed that the association belongs to the members and we have a say in how things are run, on speakers, etc.

--For the Honey Judging you will need a clean1 # plastic jar, with lid and filled just to the first rim of the jar so there is no space between honey and lid when it is looked over. You can purchase your jar from Dave if you need one. Do not put any info on the jar. Honey judging sheets will be posted on the web, Dave passed out several sheets. Bragging rights only for the winner.

--Libby noted she has one hive doing very well and another is weak. Suggestion: put the poor hive on top of the active hive with a queen excluder between them to help boost the weak hive. --How can you keep a swarm in the hive: Try putting a frame of brood in the swarm to keep nurse bees from leaving.

--Blooming Report, Dorie: Butter Mint, Cabbage, Chinese Privet, Dog Hollow, Gopher Apple, Mexican Clover, Red Bay, Spider Wort, Tulip trees Tupelo and Ligustrum, White Dutch Clover. After Spring plant Buck Wheat, bees love it and Standard Feed has it.

NEW BUSINESS:

8:10 Apiary NUCS will be available. Our plan was to raise bees and help new beekeepers get started. We have guidelines for folks receiving our NUCS at \$55 with a Mentor for 1 year. Dave passed this out and it is priority for New Beekeepers on a Lottery system in case we have more requests than NUCS. We will plan to start in JUNE, contact any of the Ex Committee esp. Ray V. or Dave S. NUCS can sell now for \$185-217 elsewhere. If we have a surplus of bees we can offer to members who have had bees but have none now and or the 4H Club.
