-- President Report: Thank Debra Perkins and Christine Nicolodi for their help at the Gold Head state Park, Yesterday's Festival. We gave CCF Honey for their raffle and promised to come again next yr. --Emails were sent out to the volunteers for the "Kids and Bees" was sent out to volunteers who assisted with the confusing event. Hopefully, anyone charged for parking you will be reimbursed. Conference and Trade show issues were addressed this with Sara Reid Laird and AFB.

-- Hive Management: Continue to monitor for SHB and Mites. Do your Mite treatments now. NY State has approved the Extended Oxalic Acid Strips with Honey supers. Brood is building up, peaches, blueberries and oranges have started blooming. Drones are building up. Swarms are starting.

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-- With the cold weather the hives are low on honey be sure to feed your hives 1:1 sugar water that will help generate heat and feed the bees.

-- Jan and Feb are the best times to repair and repaint your hives because you may be doing splits in Feb and the busy time of the year is upon us.

--Apiary Report: 1 Langstroth hive, 8 NUCS. Top Bar hive is empty. Rob H. noted that loosing 50% of your hives over winter is not uncommon.

-- Mentor Report: Ray was not present, he had surgery a Get Well card passed around for him.

--Membership Chair: membership is looking good, thanks to all who have updated their dues. Please let Sue W. know if you are going to work at the CC Fair this year and what days, we need volunteers for the CCF and Honey House Cleaning and Honey Bottling. 7:25 Speaker, Ric k Kline presented how to manage Splits and Swarms.

Swarms are Natures way of conducting Splits for a Hive outgrowing their home, reducing Mites, the Queen is not producing. Beekeepers do Splits to expand his hives and help reduce crowding of the hives. He noted that pollen and nectar are becoming abundant. Bees are expanding with Drone Cells. Not Queen cells as yet. Bees produce Queen cells after Drone Cells to ensure the Queens will have Drones to mate with. Queen Cells will be on the bottom of the frames in a normal split and in the center of the frames if the queen has been lost or damaged.

A Walk Away Split is when you have 2 stacked Brood boxes and split them to make 2 hives. They both must have eggs, brood and Larva to ensure the one box without the Queen will be able to make one and can sustain themselves. For a new Queen the hive will take 62-72 days to come up to full functioning hive.

When to split is when the hive becomes too full, there is no room for the Queen to Lay eggs. If the bees sense this they will make swarm cells and the hive will split. Split the hive before she emerges from her cell along with brood, honey, pollen, and nurse bees. If the old hive has more queen cells still there you may need to split again or remove those cells or they hive will swarm.
